German Plan To 'Smash' U. S. Charged

Ex-Envoy Bliss Asks Quick Aid to Allies At Citizens' Rally

Declaring Hitler had announced that "the United States must be smashed, as well as England and France," former Ambassador Robert Woods Bliss yesterday urged a meeting of prominent citizens to work for immediate American aid to the Allies.

Bliss addressed a gathering at the home of Huston Thompson, chairman of the Washington branch of the National Committee to Defend America by Aiding the Allies. Plans for extending the work of the District chapter by staging a mass meeting here at an early date were discussed, and committees appointed to work with various professional, educational and social organizations.

Editor White to Speak

William Allen White, of Emporia, Kan., a founder of the movement, will be asked to address the rally here, the committee announced, and invitations also will be sent to President James Bryant Conant, of Harvard; Senator Claude Pepper (D.), of Florida, and other leading advocates of Allied support.

In discussing dangers facing the United States, Bliss pointed to Hitler's boast that "Germany would rule the world by 1940," adding that Hitler so far had carried out every threat he has made.

Urges All Aid to Allies

"It is necessary," he said, "that the United States should spare no effort within its power, short of an actual declaration of war, to aid those who now are fighting our battles across the sea."

Dwight Davis was named vice-chairman of the Washington committee.

"The masses of the United States cry out for a new party, for a modern Abraham Lincoln, as the only solution of the crisis of today, the crisis of the breakdown in capitalism, the crisis of imperialist war that threatens destruction to the world," Browder said in a speech of acceptance which was broadcast over a nation-wide hook-up.

Broadcasting companies announced today that under the Federal Communications law it was obliged to give time to all political parties. Columbia suggested that the law be changed to eliminate such a requirement where the political party in question is known to be subservient to a foreign power.

Opposition to the President's armament program and to any American intervention in Latin-America, China, or the Dutch East Indies was pledged by the convention representatives of the Communist party. Support for the peace policies of the Soviet Union also was pledged.
