The Mayor acted after a hearing for Blanchard and the other two, Albert Gates and Martin Rossman, on charges of inciting to riot, conspiracy and carrying concealed deadly weapons. All three were arrested after a disorder at the Apex Hosiery Mills last week.

Literature found by the police described the Minute Men as a patriotic organization, but M. Herbert Syme, counsel for Branch No. 1 of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers, several days ago termed the organization "an outfit financed by employers to fight unionism." Fred C. Krivonos, a representative of the La Follette Senate civil liberties investigation committee, was present at the hearing. Syme had asked the Department of Justice to investigate the organization.
