

Mrs. Dilling Ordered Sent Here To Face Sedition Charges

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—The United States Marshal's bullpen received its most fashionably dressed prisoner in years today when Mrs. Elizabeth Dilling, red-haired campaigner against Communism, was ordered held for removal to Washington for trial on a charge of conspiracy to undermine the morale of the armed forces.

Attired in a black dress, large green hat and green accessories, Mrs. Dilling was led from a Federal commissioner's office to the bullpen by deputies, although she said she'd rather wait in the office where about 30 of her friends had congregated.

Her attorney, William Scott Stewart, told Commissioner Edwin K. Walker she was innocent of any in-

tent to undermine morale, that the hearing was, in fact, no hearing and that she should not be removed from this Federal jurisdiction for trial.

Mr. Walker cited several Supreme Court decisions and said he could do nothing but order her removal, and fixed her bond at \$5,000.

Mr. Stewart thereupon said he would go before Judge John P. Barnes to ask a private review of the commissioner's hearing.

Mrs. Dilling was the only woman among 28 persons indicted in Washington on the Federal conspiracy charge. She was accused of having circulated cartoons drawn by a Chicago artist and financed by a Chicago dentist. The artist and dentist are among the 28 defendants.
