

## CINCINNATI COUGHLINITES REAFFIRM THEIR ISOLATIONIST STAND — CHEER 5TH COLUMNIST

Cincinnati, Ohio (Special to Jewish Review) — 100 members of Mothers of Sons Forum, American Charter group and Farmers' Protective Association, recently attended a regular bi-monthly meeting

at 514 Vine Street, Cincinnati, where they cheered Carl H. Mote's statement, "I was an isolationist before Pearl Harbor and I am still an isolationist." Mote, a former editor, lawyer and ex-superintendent of schools at Parker, Indiana, lives at 960 No. Pennsylvania Street, Indianapolis. He informed his audience that General Robert E. Wood, who is a personal friend of his, had told him recently that he believed America First should never have been abandoned.

"Our only victories so far — those in the Coral Seas and adjacent to Midway Island — completely prove the pre-war thesis of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh." Mote continued: Ethel Green and her "mothers" applauded this statement vigorously. Anti-Semitism was flaunted constantly; the "international bankers," the "Jewish press," Wallace and Willkie shared the ridicule that Mote hurled on the "New Deal Revolutionists"; Willkie for selling himself

to the people through "Clifton Fadiman, a Jew." Representatives Elston and Hess (37.5 per cent), were hailed for re-election. The audience frequently spoke of Father Coughlin; "that's just what Father Coughlin would say," or "Father is not afraid to speak."

Mote distributed a pamphlet "An American Political Platform" which calls for a complete bar of all immigration for 25 years and a ban against foreign-born holding office. Also demanded is an immediate "end to the management of the executive branch . . . by an alien born justice of the judicial branch." Cincinnati seems to be the only community where the American Charter has been in evidence.
