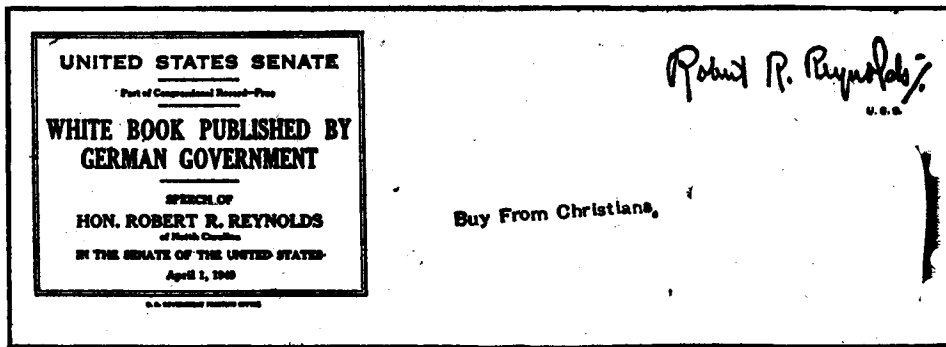


# Anti-Semites Using Subways To Distribute Literature



Anti-Semitic leaflets are being distributed in 1940 franked envelopes of Sen. Reynolds in an underground throw-away campaign aimed at subway riders. Here's one that was recently picked up.

Anti-Semites literally have gone underground—to the subways—to distribute their literature.

In every reported evidence of the new technique, the anti-Jewish leaflets were contained in an unaddressed envelope bearing the frank of Sen. Robert R. Reynolds. Rubber-stamped on each envelope was the slogan "Buy from Christians." (See illustration.) Each envelope also contained a copy of a speech made by Reynolds on April 1, 1940, in which he relied upon a Nazi White Book to demand an investigation of American diplomats.

The envelopes have been left on subway seats or tucked in the grillings of subway stairs.

The Reynolds speech and the leaflets are both of early 1940 vintage. The number of reported instances indicate, however, that the current distribution represents a planned campaign.

The only name appearing on the anti-Semitic leaflets is that of the "Society for the Advancement of Christians."

In some of the envelopes are small yellow cards defending the Christian Fronters who were charged with sedition and subsequently found not guilty. In others there were Nazi-type anti-Jewish cartoons.

The American Jewish Congress has written Reynolds asking him: "How is it that your two-year-old speech is available for circulation in Sept. 1942?"

The Congress demanded that Reynolds publicly repudiate the use of the speech and call for an investigation of those circulating it.

To date, no answer has been received from Reynolds.
