PLOT JURY ASKS FURTHER REVIEW

Requests Rereading of Large Portion of Record.

The jury, which will decide the fate of the fourteen men charged in Brooklyn with conspiring to overthrow the Federal Government, appeared in the Federal court there

appeared in the Federal court there at 2:35 P. M. today, more than twenty-four hours after it began its deliberations, and asked that a large portion of the 1,500,000 words in the court record be read to them. When word that they had asked Judge Marcus Campbell to return to the court room reached some 400 friends and relatives of the defendants, who were waiting, the atmosphere became electric. It was thought that a verdict had been reached.

Some of these who were keeping

Some of these who were keeping the vigil in the court room dropped to their knees in prayer and others sat in strained silence.

The jury, which has been serving for eleven weeks, asked that large portions of the testimony of Dennis Healy, the Government's key witness, be read, as well as some given by Inspector Earl Connolley of the Federal Bureau of Identification.

It also asked Judge Campbell to define again the words "conspiracy," "intent" and "presumption of innocence."
