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Jury in Front Case Argues for 2nd Day

Weary after ten hours of arguing to reach a verdict in the Christian Front case in Brooklyn Federal Court, the woman foreman led the 11 male jurors back to the jury room from the luncheon table this afternoon to continue deliberations.

The case against the 14 defendants—13 charged with conspiring to overthrow the U. S. Government; one with conspiring to steal Government munitions—was given the jury by Judge Campbell at 12:52 p. m. yesterday.

LOCKED UP FOR NIGHT

At 11 p. m. the jury, with Mrs. Helen B. Titus, housewife, as foreman, was locked up in the Hotel St. George, and at 10 a. m. today the jury returned to its deliberations.

The trial began 11 weeks ago. The 13 defendants, if convicted of plotting to overthrow the Gov-

ernment, will be liable to eight years in prison. The 14th defendant, Sergeant Alfred J. Quinlan, 27, of the Old Fighting 69th, will face but two years on the lesser charge.

Believed to be a friend of one of the defendants, Mrs. Margaret McSweeney, of 3410 Clarendon rd., Brooklyn, a spectator, fainted in the courtroom and was sent home.

WAIT IN COURTROOM

With the exception of the alleged ringleader, William Gerald Bishop, who has been in jail since the group were rounded up last January, the accused hung about the courtroom today with their relatives.

Judge Campbell, in his charge to the jury, advised:

"The defendants did not have to design directly to overthrow the Government. That could be accomplished just as well by inciting

other classes, Communists or Jews to revolt and then in the hour of emergency to come in and overthrow the Government.

"There isn't any question of religion here whatever. We are not trying the Christian Front. We are trying this group only.

"As I see it, the Christian Front was merely used as a recruiting ground."
