U.S. Weighs Fate Of 5 in Plot Trial

Attorney General's Staff as Undecided as Jury Was in Mistrial

Surprised and a mite bitter, members of the U.S. Attorney General's staff were hotly debating today what to do with the five alleged conspirators over whom a jury yesterday failed to agree, after a costly 11 weeks' trial and 124 hours of verdict

weighing.
Their nine co-detendants, accused of conspiracy against the U.S. Government in an E. Phillips Oppenheim scheme to seize arsenals, were acquitted. Nothing more can be done to or with them.

But their alleged leader, 29-year-old William Gerald Bishop, is still in jail. Macklin Boettger, 32, Brooklyn salesman; John T. Prout, 29, New York National Guard captain; John A. Viebrock, 34, Brooklyn elevator mechanic; William H. D. Bushnell Jr., 18, Brooklyn student-have been released on
