## ICKES TO SPEAK ON DIES COMMITTEE AT WASHINGTON PEACE AND DEMOCRACY CONGRESS JANUARY 6th

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 31 -- Harold L. Tokes, Secretary of the Interior will speak on "the Dies Committee and its un-American activities under the auspices of the American Congress for Peace and Democracy on January 6th at a rally for labor and democratic rights in the Rialto Theatre, it was announced today. The speech will be broadcast over a national hookup at 9:30 that evening.

A representation considerably larger than the 4,025,920 of last year is anticipated at the Congress which will meet here in the Rialto Theatre on January 6, 7 and 8.

This week New York City, whose delegates last year represented 420,000 men and women in organizations of all kinds, already has credentials for elected delegates representing more than 650,000 persons.

Chicago reports a delegation of approximately 100 which includes representatives of many unions and Czechoslovakian organizations with hundreds of thousands of members.

Delegates elected by unions and farm groups throughout the country, by church, youth and women's organizations, by fraternal and language groups, show the growth and strength of American sentiment for a positive peace policy, for lifting the embargo on Spain, for placing an embargo on Japan and Nazi Germany. Many groups sending delegates to Washington have never before participated in a national Congress called by the American League for Peace and Democracy. This will be the fifth national assemblage.

Special trains, chartered buses and a cavalcade of cars will converge in Washington on January 6th and 7th bringing delegates from almost every state in the nation.

Many delegates will reach Washington on Friday, the 6th, in time to attend the meeting that evening when in addition to Secretary Ickes, labor leaders of both the C.I.O. and A.F. of L. will speak. A. F. Whitney, president, Brother-hood of Railroad Trainmen, will precide at the meeting. Speakers will include Richard Frankensteen, international vice-president, United Auto Workers; E.F. McLaurin, international field organizer, Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters; Jerome Davis and Mary Foley Grossman, president and vice-president respectively, American Federation of Teachers; and Joseph Breslaw, international vice-president,

International Ladies! Garment Workers Union.

Dr. Harry F. Ward, national chairman of the American League for Peace and Democracy, will give his report to the opening session of the Congress on Saturday morning. Dr. Walter Judd, medical missionary recently returned after ten years in China, will speak on "America's Responsibility in the Japanese Invasion of China".

During the Saturday afternoon session speakers will be Howard Costigan, executive secretary, Washington Commonwealth Federation; Herbert Biberman, delegate from the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League; the Rev. Myles D. Blanchard, chairman, Miami Branch, American League for Peace and Democracy; Ted Christiansen, vice-president, Scandinavian Seamen's Club.
