NMU Asks Congress Put An End To Dies Attack On Unions

EW YORK-Withhold addi-NEW YORK—Withhold addi-tional funds for the Dies Commit-tee and stop its "unprincipled at-tacks on labor," our Union urged this week in a letter mailed to every member of Congress. We proposed that if any more money is appropriated for dis-covering un-American activities, it be given to the Senate Civil

it be given to the Senate Civil Liberties Committee, headed by Senaton LaFollette.

Senator LaFollette. "The same amount of money made available to the LaFollette Committee," the letter says, "would be used to uncover viola-tions of the Wagner Act and at-tacks on our civil liberties. These are the un-American activities." The so-called Dies investigation is actually part of an anti-union campaign by "labor-hating em-ployers," the letter implies. Our own experience is cited,

Our own experience is cited, backed up by our pamphlet "Labor Spies In The NMU," which was enclosed with each letter. The case of William McCuistion, shipowner stooge and disrupter, is indicative of a connection between the Dies Committee and anti-ion employers. ion employers.

Wanted by the police of New York and New Orleans for the Carey murder case, McCuistion suddenly popped up as a witness for Dies.

"Someone working for the Dies Committee knew exactly where McCuistion was hiding," the letter charges.

And when McCuistion was arrested, "Dies and (Rep.) Starnes competed with each other in rising to his defense and in attacking law enforcement agencies whe did their sworn duty by arresting him."
