In his third article Congressman Dies on page 22 of the magazine says of that the CIO that it is "partly under the control of the Communist Party."

On page 13 of the report issued two weeks before the appearance of this article, a report to which Congressman Dies' name was affixed, there appears the following: "It is unmistakably clear that the overwhelming majority of the members of the CIO as well as its president are not Communists are Communist sympathizers but sincere American workers seeking to improve their lot in a perfectly legitimate American fashion. The evidence before the Committee indicates, however, that the leadership of some 10 or 12 of the constituent unions of the CIO, out of a total of some 48 unions, is more than tinged with Communism."

There is a vast difference between Congressman Dies' statement that the international trade union is "partly under the control of the Communist Party" and the statement of the entire committee, including Congressman Dies, that there is "evidence" that a small percentage of the constituent members of this organization are "more than tinged with Communism."

It should be pointed out that unions earlier described by
Committee members and witnesses as Communist dominated organizations
do not appear in the second report. Among these unions are the
United Automobile Workers, the Steel Workers Organizing Committee,
The American Newspaper Guild, the Amalgamated Clothing Workers,
the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, the textile
Workers
workers' union, the Packing House/Organizing Committee, The Farm
Equipment Organizing Committee and the International Wood Workers of
America
