'Red' Scare Fails To Scare Speakers

In one thunderous voice 3000 members and friends of the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League Wednesday night demanded the dissolution of the Dies Investigating Committee for its attacks on progressive organizations.

Presented by Donald Ogden Stewart, chairman of the League, the resolution condemning the Committee was addressed to President Roosevelt, the La Follette Civil Liberties Committee, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

It demanded an honest investigation of un-American activities by the LaFollette Committee because "its work and investigations have benefitted the cause of democracy and manifested its integrity."

It was a widely representative collection of speakers that looked over the footlights at the crowd that filled every seat in the Philharmonic Auditorium.

May I begin with a very short rsonal remark. There is one oint, a single one, where I agree with the people who attacked the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League and who are being castigated by you tonight. If these people say that foreigners should not interefere with American politics, I believe they are right. So, when some days ago a committee of the League asked me to speak at this meeting, being still a foreigner in this country, I hesitated.

I thought it might do more harm than good. However, the committee put forward an argument that finally convinced me. They pointed out that very similar situations have existed in Germany before the Nazis came into power, very much the same accusations, and that these very proceedings greatly helped to undermine the German Republic and to pave the road for Adolf Hitler.

They began to yield. They did not dare to support the Reichsnot dare to support the Reichs-Banner any longer by which they supported themselves. They wobbled. They staggered. They ventured, for the sake of peace, that it might be better to restrain the activities of the Reichs-Banner, to hide it by and by from the public eye. After all—was there really any danger for the Republic? Had not Mr. Hitler, as many times as you liked him to, pledged his word of honor and taken it upon his oath in court, that he would never try to overthrow the constitution? They believed him. They were, perhaps, no statesmen, but they were gentlemen.
