The The special House committee investigat-ing un-American activities heard charges today that public funds were being used to finance com-muniam in the United States; that prominent Federal officials were prominent Federal officials were members of the American Lasgue for Peace and Democracy, alleged to be part of the Communist "front" in this country; that the Workers Alliance, with a member-ship of about 80,000, was controlled by Communists, and that the Amer-ican Students Union, with a re-ported membership of 20,000, was organized by Communists.

organized by Communists. Representative Noah M. Mason of Illinois, a member of the commit-tes, charged that eight high rank-ing Federai officials were members of the American League for Peace and Democracy, which, he asserted, is being used to advance the cause of Communism in the United States.

Mr. Chaillaux was asked by Mr. Mason if the Workers Alliance was con-trolled by Communist. "It is controlled," repiled Mr. Chaillaux, "by the Communist party, although, in my opinion, the great majority of its, 800,000 members do not know that this is the case." "In other words," said Chairman Dies, who had in mind the fact that the membership of the Work-ers Alliance is made up largely of WPA workers, "public funds are being used to further communism in this country?" "That is true," said Mr. Chail-laux, who added that the Alliance orpresented itself as a collective bars gaining agency for WPA workers.
