

**ATLANTA 6 BAIL
HEARING JUNE 7**

**Organizers Held on
Death Charges**

ATLANTA, Ga., May 25—Overruling the objections of the International Labor Defense, the demand for the release on bail of the six workers facing death on charges of "insurrection"—M. H. Powers, Joseph Carr, Mary Dalton, Anna Burlak, Gilmer Brady and Henry Storey, was postponed to June 7. On that date the court will decide whether the six workers will be released on bail or continue to sit in their prison cells. Oliver C. Hancock appeared as attorney for the International Labor Defense at the hearing.

The workers arrested on Wednesday have all been active in the labor movement. Brady was an active member of the Post Office Clerks' Union in Boston before becoming national organizer of the American Negro Labor Congress. Dalton was connected with the Office Workers' Union in New York, while Burlak was an organizer of the National Textile Workers' Union in New England before she went South.

A meeting of the editors of all labor newspapers will be held in New York on Monday, at which time the publicity campaign for the liberation of the six workers will be taken up. One of the questions on the order of business will be the issuing of special editions of the respective newspapers in connection with the campaign and the June 7th anniversary of the defense of the Gastonia tent colony.

"The arrests of these working class fighters," reads a statement issued by the Atlanta branch of the I. L. D. which reached New York City recently, "does not mean the stopping of the movement in Atlanta. The workers of Atlanta will hold bigger protest meetings and will fight for the building up of a strong and determined movement under the leadership of the Communist Party and the Trade Union Unity League."
