## 'Valtin' Seized

## For Internment

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. - Richard Krebs, who wrote a best-seller Out of the Night under the name of Jan Valtin, has been arrested for deportation to Germany and interned for the duration of the war.
Immigration authorities, acting under an order approved by Attorney General Francis Biddle, took him into custody at Bethel, Conn., after the


Jan Valtin Board of Immigration Appeals ruled that Krebs had entered the U. S. A. illegally.

Although the accuracy of Valtin's bio. graphical work has been challenged widely the board appeared to have read the worls and accepted it as fact.
Its decision, made public following Krebs ${ }^{6}$ arrest, reported his career "so marked with violence, intrigue, and treachery that would be difficult, if not wholly unwarranted, to conclude that his present reliabil. ity and good character has been established."

Without divulging the sources of its inf formation about Krebs, the board reported that:

He was "a member of the Communist Party of Germany, a section of the Communist International," from 1923 to 193\%.
He came to the U. S. A. "on orders from Communist Party superiors", as a stowaway and acted on orders "to commit murder by a Communist Party official in Lós Angeles.

He became an executive officer of the International Seamen and Harbor Workers and "the Comintern's chief trouble-maker on the waterfronts of Europe, hunted by police of half a dozen nations."
