## Hoffman to Testify In Axis Propaganda **Inquiry Today**

## House Member Notifies. Justice Department of Intention to Appear

Representative Hoffman, Re-publican, of Michigan notified the Department of Justice that the Department of Justice that he would appear before the grand jury investigating Axis propa-ganda activities today, Special Assistant to the Attorney Gen-eral William Power Maloney announced.

Representative Hoffman was "re-quested" to appear, but no subpoena was issued. The legislator, who had been out of the city, called the Jus-tice Department this morning to in-form Mr. Maloney that he would appear

form Mr. Maloney that he would appear. Mr. Hoffman has been an out-spoken critic of the administra-tion's foreign policy. While the prosecutor did not reveal what he wanted to question Mr. Hoffman about, it was expected the subject would be the wide distribution of a speech which the Michigan member made, called "Roosevelt Is a Judas." Assertedly this speech was distrib-uted by subversive organizations. Appearing before the grand jurors this morning was Mrs. David Stan-ley of Cleveland, Ohio. Mrs. Stan-ley was reportedly formerly affili-ated with an isolationist group called the United Mothers of America.

Other Probable Witnesses.

Other Probable Witnesses. Others slated as probable wit-nesses today were the Rev. Gerald B. Winrod, Wichita (Kans.) evan-gelist; Charles B. Hudson, Nebras-kan, editor of America in Danger, and E. J. Garner, editor of Publicity, a Kansas publication. Hudson is in District Jail, where Justice Jennings Balley committed him last week for contempt. He was charged with refusing to tell the grand jury who printed a post card he distributed. Justice Balley sen-tenced the witness to three months, but gave him 10 days in which to purge himself of the contempt by giving the grand jury the informa-tion it wanted. Went Back Before Jury.

Hudson went back before the jury Friday and answered further questions.

Mr. Maloney said today there were no new developments in the Hud-son case. The prosecutor said he did not think it necessary to bring Hudson before Justice Bailey again in the present case unless the pub-lisher refuses to answer further questions. Waiting in an anteroom this morning were Hudson's wife and son, William. It was disclosed today that Attor-ney General Biddle has directed Mr. Maloney, a special assistant, and others in the Criminal Division of the Justice Department to proceed vigorously against any subversive or defeatist publications or circulars that may be uncovered.
