

# McNaboe Issues Writ for Kuhn In Nazi Probe

## 'Dynamite' Promised When Bund Chief Is Questioned

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Fritz Kuhn, president of the Nazi-controlled German-American Bund, was subpoenaed today to testify before the McNaboe Legislative Committee at the opening of a public investigation into Nazi activities in this State.

State Senator John J. McNaboe, chairman of the committee, announced Kuhn would be one of the principal witnesses at a three-day hearing from June 22-24 in Room 408 at the Supreme Court Building.

At least three other key men in the Nazi movement also have been served with subpoenas, Senator McNaboe said.

### POLICE CO-OPERATE.

Indicating widespread co-operation of city authorities with the Legislative Committee, Police Commissioner Valentine assigned several of his crack officers to aid the State investigators, it was learned.

District Attorney Munder of Suffolk County, who has obtained indictments against six Nazi leaders of Camp Siegfried, at Yaphank, L. I., also has pledged his co-operation, as have a number of other county prosecuting officials.

This will be Kuhn's first appearance on the witness stand to submit to questioning on activities of his organization.

Promising surprises at the inquiry, Senator McNaboe said:

"This is going to be dynamite. We're going to show exactly what these Nazis are up to in this country. We have the evidence in our hands now."

### WIDE PROBE INDICATED.

The committee intends to bring out salient facts concerning:

- 1—The spread of Nazism in the State and what is behind it.
  - 2—The extent to which private armies have been organized.
  - 3—Whether funds of foreign origin have aided the Bund.
  - 4—The immediate objective of Nazis here.
  - 5—A study of any alleged "racketeering" involving members of the group.
  - 6—To what end the Nazis seek to arouse class hatred.

- The indictments against the six Nazi chieftains charged violation of the State civil rights law, passed in 1923, which made it mandatory for all organizations to file membership lists with the Secretary of State...at Albany.
