## NAZI CAMP TO GO ON DESPITE CONVICTIONS

Fete for 20,000 Planned as Six Prepare to Appeal

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Despite the conviction of six incorporators of the organization that operates a camp at Yaphank, L. I., for American Nazi sympathizers, leaders of the German-American Bund are planning "something special" at the camp in about two weeks for a gathering of "twenty to thirty thousand people," they said yesterday.

"This Sunday the activities at the camp will be just as usual, possibly more," said James Wheeler-Hill, New York leader of the bund. "We are not planning anything special this week, as we will have special activities this Sunday at Camp Nordland, in New Jersey. But in a couple of weeks, maybe on the following Sunday, we will have something special.

Bund leaders were planning an appeal from the German-American Settlement League, Inc., which bestates Camp Siegfried, and the league's six incorporators on charges of violating the State Civil Hights aw Judge L. Barron Hills in Sunfolk County Court at Riverhead L. I., imposed a fine of \$10,000 on saich defendant. He imposed one year jail sentences, but suspended them for all the defendants except Ernst Mueller, league president.

William I. Karle, defense attorney, said he probably would move for certificates of reasonable doubt on Saturday or Monday in Supreme Court in Brooklyn. Such action would be taken to admit Mueller to bail pending appeal and to continue bonds of \$1,000 each for the other defendants and the league. Whether the league will pay the fine now is to oe determined in a day or two, he said. Mr. Wheeler-Hill said the league had the money ready.
