

A Nazi Hall by Any Name Will Still Be a Nazi Hall

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Shakespeare's question, "What's in a name" has arisen in Carmen's Union 1004, and the carmen are baffled as Romeo—or was it Juliet?

Some time ago the Carmen's ladies auxiliary hired a hall for a dance from the Mercury Athletic Club at 1553 Page St. About a week later the hall became known as the new headquarters of the German-American (Nazi) Bund when it held a reception for Baron Manfred Von Killinger, former Hitler terrorist chief, and now Consul General of the Nazi government in San Francisco.

Irene Noll, president of the auxiliary, was instructed by her membership to cancel the contract. In calling up she was told the hall was not a Nazi hall, that it was not the property of the German-American Bund, that it was a mistake to permit the Nazis to enter, and their bloody-handed leader

Von Killinger there, and that the true owner of the hall was the German-American Business Men's Association.

When Irene Noll clung to her suspicions and rented Roesch Hall at 15th and Mission Sts., the 1553 Page St. people protested, this time claiming they were the German-American Vocational Society. The dance was held last Saturday night.

Last night the Carmen's union received another protest. This time 1553 Page claimed they were not the German-American Bund, but the German-American Merchantmen's Association.

The carmen don't want to hear any more and say, please
