# CITIZENS PLAN MASS PICKETING OF NAZI PARTY

## Notorious Leaders of Bund to Speak at Convention

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4. — Picket lines of thousands of anti-fascists are expected to greet the first Nazi Convention to be held in Los Angeles, Saturday, August 6th, at the Deutsches Haus, 634 West 15th Street, at 8 p.m.

Following the announcement of the Nazi convention in an exclusive story in the People's World on July 19th, the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League for the Defense of American Democracy made plans for a monster protest by all Los Angeles.

Hundreds of civic, trade union, fraternal, cultural, progressive, liberal and anti-fascist organizations have been invited to join in this repudiation of the Hitler fascist regime and its agents in Los Angeles.

### Notorious Nazis to Attend

In its call for a mass demonstration to protest the un-American activities of the Nazi organization in Los Angeles, the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League urges "all those who don't want Nazism in America," and "all lovers of democracy" to join the gigantic picket line.

Henry Allen, Nazi agent, Herman Schwinn, director of the Deutsches Haus, and Fritz Kuhn, leader of the German American Bund, all three well known Nazi agents, are scheduled to speak at the Nazi Convention.

The convention was announced in a special number of the "Christian Free Press" which asked that all organizations with "American Christian" principles join in the convention to "prevent the Sovietizing of the Pacific Coast by the Jewish Communists."

### Demagogic Appeal

Other ludicrous and demagogic appeals are directed to the American Indians, urging them to join the convention to prevent the "Bolshevizing and robbing of their lands."

Pages of the "Free Press" are devoted to a speech by Henry Allen, who will be tried August 9 on charges of fraudulent registration. Allen has served two terms in Lehigh and San Quentin prisons. Despite the fact that under California law conviction of two felonies automatically cancels the right to vote, Allen registered for voting in January, 1936.
