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Picket Hitlerites

Tripling the number expected by the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League, Los Angeles citizens poured out of their homes by the thousands Saturday night in one of the biggest demonstrations this town has ever seen to tell the Nazi agents of Adolf Hitler that they are not wanted here.

Traffic was completely shut off for more than an hour as demonstrators packed the entire block in front of the Deutsches Haus, 634 West 15th Street, where the first Nazi convention ever held in Los Angeles was in progress.

In the throng were many members of the American Legion, American League for Peace and Democracy, A. F. of L. and CIO, United Anti-Nazi Conference, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Young Democrats, Cosmopolitan Federa-tion, Hungarian Workers Organization, California Christian Church Council, and Canadian War Veter-

Congressional candidates, P. Entenza, running in the 13th District, and Ordean Rockey, running in the 16th, showed their anti-Nazi sympathies by joining the picket line.

A band sent out by the Musicians Union led the crowd in patriotic songs.

Confining their expressions of indignation to slogans and banners, the pickets for the most part marched in orderly, quiet lines until the street became too crowded for them to walk. Then, although loath to leave, they departed at the request of their lead-

The Anti-Nazi League had invited other groups to join with it in the protest only on condition that they maintain order and do nothing to incite violence, since the purpose of the demonstration was not to intimidate the Nazis but to inform the public of the true character of the "anti-Communist" convention.

The sole threat of riot or violence came from a small group of individuals whose placards showed them to be affiliated with the Independent Labor League of America, Young People's Socialist League, and the Fourth International.
