FISH ASSAULTS NEW DEAL

Meanwhile, Congressman Hamilton Fish, speaking as an official of the Republican Party, last night tried to turn a German Day celebration into a rally against the New Deal and President Roosevelt's peace policy.

The red-baiting Congressman spoke before the Madison Square Garden rally of 10,000 called by the United German Societies, German American Conference.

Fish paid high tribute to Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, who he said "almost single-handedly saved Europe." The Tory Congressman went so far as to recommend that Chamberlain, betrayer of peace and friend of Hitler, be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

The meeting had barred the Fritz Kuhn Nazis three weeks ago. However, apparently as a result of the policy of concessions to the aggressors, the meeting gave a Sudestka German a place of honor, a swastika flag was displayed, and the Nazi Horst Wessel anthem sung, as well as Deutschland Uber Alles. Only a small section of the audience gave the Nazi salute when the Horst Wessel was sung.

Outside the Garden, more than 300 workers distributed leaflets, urging attendance at the German Day Celebration Dec. 4 at Royal Windsor Palace, where Thomas Mann will speak.

Lash New Deal

A line which grew to 500 within a half hour picketed the Nazi German-American Bund meeting last night to protest Hitler's invasion of Czechoslovakia.

While the picket line, with an American flag in front was in progress, in Turnhall, 85th St. and Lexington Ave., Fritz Kuhn's Nazi organization was turning the traditionally progressive German-American Day celebration into a victory meeting for the fascist invasion.

As the picket line of the American League for Peace and Democracy swelled with German and Hungarian members of progressive and workers' organizations in Yorkville, Deputy Chief Inspector Costuma ordered the pickets to break their ranks.

Costuma said that the police force, originally 170 together with mounted men, was increased to 500 because of the picketing. He threatened to break the line if the pickets did not disband. The picket line then reformed on Third Ave. and marched clear around the block bounded by 85, 86th St. and Lexington and Third Ave. shouting slogans to picket on the street opposite Turnhall.
