

# Success of Anti-Nazi Rally Cited

Only 100 Nazis  
Passed Line,

## Says Peace League

Nazi leaders yesterday hailed the success of Sunday's demonstration against the Nazi German-American Bund meeting at Lincoln Turner Hall, 1019 W. Diversey Blvd.

Gilbert Roche, secretary of the Chicago American League for Peace and Democracy, declared that while the demonstration was in progress that the maximum number of persons in the hall was 120. The league had three observers in the hall during that time, said Roche.

Roche asserted that the Nazis shrunk from going through the closed ranks of the 7,000 demonstrators, who booed, hissed, catcalled, and shouted "Down with Hitler," at them, even though they were afforded police protection.

Dr. Eric von Schroetter, secretary of the German-American League for Culture, praised the discipline of the demonstrators.

Von Schroetter declared:

"The Nazi spy trial in New York should convince the people of Chicago of the real anti-American nature of the Nazi German-American Bund. Then Chicago would join the long list of cities which will not permit these enemies of democracy to hold meetings."

All 13 arrested demonstrators were freed. The only one held overnight was the sole woman arrested, Mrs. Rose Sebek, 45, who was dismissed in Judge Oscar Caplan's court yesterday.
