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# Rally Here Tomorrow Hits Nazis

Expect 2,500  
To Jam Orchestra  
Hall Meeting

Fascist brutalities against racial and religious minorities will be protested by prominent leaders in every walk of life at a mass meeting called by the Chicago Council Against Nazi Outrages, tomorrow at 8:30 p. m. in Orchestra Hall, 215 S. Michigan Ave.

Admission to the meeting will be free, Ira Latimer, secretary of the council, stated yesterday. This meeting follows a similar gathering of 3,500 people held Sunday night under the auspices of the Jewish Peoples Committee Against Fascism and Anti-Semitism in Ashland Auditorium.

Latimer said that he expected 2,500 people to attend the meeting tomorrow. Prof. Paul H. Douglass, of the University of Chicago, who will also act as chairman, heads the list of distinguished citizens who will condemn Nazi atrocities.

Other speakers include Rabbi Louis L. Mann of Sinai Temple; Rev. Theodore Home, chairman of the world affairs committee of the Chicago Church Federation; Simon H. Baldus, editor of the church Extension Magazine (Catholic); and Jarsólay J. Zrnhal, district superintendent of Chicago schools. Numerous prominent citizens of every profession are acting as sponsors of the meeting.

Music will be rendered by a German anti-fascist singing society. One of the numbers will be the famous German song, "Die Lorelei," now forbidden by the Nazi government because its words were written by the Jewish poet, Heinrich Heine.

Resolutions passed at Sunday's meeting demanded an embargo on German goods, immediate admission of refugees into this country through liberalization of the immigration laws, and cooperation with other democracies to deal with the refugee problem.
