"Through-Struggle to Victory!" and the local s weren't talking about Nazis weren't victory for the democratic nations or victory in the ab-stract. An undertone of anti - Semitism

This banquet was held on Feb. 17, 1938. And the Nazi pro-gram of world conquest had already become abundantly clear in Spain

in Austria, in Czechoslovakia. One of the "Honorary Guests" listed at this banquet was Edwin A. Lee, Republican member Trom Philadelphia's 22nd ward of the state House of Representatives at Harrisburg.

Another guest was Fred C. Gart-ner, who was then the Congressman from the fifth district in Philadelphia but who has since fortun-ately been retired from the House Lee, however, is running again for another term in the state legislature.

GOV. JAMES FAILS

Governor Arthur James, the Re-publican governor of Pennsylvania who is now winding up his four-year term, has failed signally to support important phases of the effort.

Jam nes was asked by the Treasury James was asked by the fractury Department and by the State, County and Municipal Workers to institute the ten per cent plan in the sale of government war bonds for state employees. He refused flativ. flatly.

The governor was also asked by the CIO union of state govern-ment workers to permit the sale of war stamps and bonds in the 580 liquor stores which are owned by the state. Again James refused. He would not even permit display of posters urging sale of bonds in the store windows
