

## Police Raid, Close Jersey

### Bund Camp

Shoo 150 Away;

### Jail 'F. D. Neighbor'

NEWARK, N. J., May 30 (N.Y. News).—New Jersey sheriffs' deputies cracked down today on Camp Nordlund, the 150-acre Nazi nest at Andover, shooed away 150 men and women gathered for Memorial Day heiling and ordered the grounds abandoned forever as a meeting place.

Sussex County Sheriff Denton J. Quick raided the camp with 15 men, acting under orders from Attorney General Wilentz. The padlock was authorized under a New Jersey statute permitting the closing of any place considered a habitual nuisance. Nordlund qualified because of dozens of arrests made there.

Most of today's visitors, many from Yorkville, complied readily with the orders to pack up and leave. One man, however, ran to a room and hurriedly tore up a letter, which Sheriff Quick, piecing it together later, described as "very important."

The man was arrested on a charge of resisting search and taken to Sussex county jail at Newton. He identified himself as Paul Huissel, 38, of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and said he was a toolmaker and a neighbor of President Roosevelt.

"I am an American citizen," he said, "but I'm not an American; I'm a German-American."

In his car, Quick's men said, they found several .22 caliber bullets. Questioned about them, Huissel snapped: "They're my own business."
