FBI Studies Code of Nazi Spy Suspect Bundsman Silent

After Long Quiz

NEWARK, N. J., June 1 (N. Y. NEWARK, N. J., June 1 (N. 1. News).—Convinced after 12 hours' grilling that Paul Huissel, 39, may be a Nazi agent sent to spy out industrial plants and public utility nerve centers, the FBI today turned its attention to cracking the elaborate code message they found in the Bundsman's Camp Nordlund cabin. Nordiund capin. Throughout a night of continu-Ous questioning, Huissel, who was arrested when he tried to tear up a code-covered sheet of paper dur-ing a raid on Camp Nordland, near Andover, N. J., Friday, re-mained surly and uncommunica-tive. tive.

Bible Code Used

Early today the FBI agents and members of the special alien squad of the Department of Imsquad of the Department of Im-migration dropped their question-ing. They photographed Huissel from a dozen angles and finger-printed him. Pictures and prints were sent to the Washington FBI offices while the code sheet, care-fully pasted together, and a Bible with words ringed in pencil ap-parently at random, were sent to the FBI code section. Huissel's 380-page diary and his detail maps of lower New York State with Westchester county res-ervoirs also were being studied.

Believe He is "Spotter"

Believe He is "Spotter" Although none of the Govern-ment agents would discuss the case, it was learned they do not consider him a top-flight spy. Rather they think his task was laying the groundwork for better-class agents, obtaining for them minute descriptions of vulnerable spots in the nation's defense setup. The names of Nazi leaders in many parts of the world appeared among the code words found in Huissel's possession.
