

FBI Studies Code of Nazi Spy Suspect T-76/241 Bundsmen Silent After Long Quiz

NEWARK, N. J., June 1 (N. Y. News).—Convinced after 12 hours' grilling that Paul Huisel, 39, may be a Nazi agent sent to spy out industrial plants and public utility nerve centers, the FBI today turned its attention to cracking the elaborate code message they found in the Bundsmen's Camp Nordlund cabin.

Throughout a night of continuous questioning, Huisel, who was arrested when he tried to tear up a code-covered sheet of paper during a raid on Camp Nordland, near Andover, N. J., Friday, remained surly and uncommunicative.

Bible Code Used

Early today the FBI agents and members of the special alien squad of the Department of Immigration dropped their questioning. They photographed Huisel from a dozen angles and fingerprinted him. Pictures and prints were sent to the Washington FBI offices while the code sheet, carefully pasted together, and a Bible with words ringed in pencil apparently at random, were sent to the FBI code section.

Huisel's 380-page diary and his detail maps of lower New York State with Westchester county reservoirs also were being studied.

Believe He is "Spotter"

Although none of the Government agents would discuss the case, it was learned they do not consider him a top-flight spy. Rather they think his task was laying the groundwork for better-class agents, obtaining for them minute descriptions of vulnerable spots in the nation's defense setup. The names of Nazi leaders in many parts of the world appeared among the code words found in Huisel's possession.
