WASHINGTON, D. C., May 23.

—Reps. Robert Rich of Pennsylvania and George Holden Tinkham of Massachusetts have thrown up the sponge, and announced that they are not running for re-election.

Rich told the House on Jan. 9 of this year that the administration "provoked Japan to attack us," and on Feb. 17 stated that "these appropriations (for war) give me the headache."

Tinkham is the embattled old defeatist who has been tied up with numerous pro - Nazi groups including the Women's National Legion of the Mothers of America. (The Worker Washington Bureau)

A particularly heavy responsibility in electing a win-the-war Congress and in beating defeatists and disruptions rests on organized labor, on the CIO and the AFL.
