

# Propaganda Probe Trail Turns to Capitol Hill

Nazi nosing of a special Federal grand jury inquiring into un-American propaganda mills will take a more direct trail next week in efforts to link Capitol Hill figures with pro-Germanic propaganda channels thru magazine sources.

Until Wednesday, the special grand jury is resting from court duties and the men and women who form it are back at their private jobs while the

Justice Department untangles several leads for presentation then. Meantime, the battle of George Hill,

one of the clerks of Rep. Fish (R., N. Y.), to escape trial on charges of perjury growing out of the removal of franked mail from a downtown office to the House Office Building, has opened.

## DEMANDS PROBE RECORDS

William Cusick, counsel for Hill,

filed with District Court a demurrer to the perjury indictment and a motion that Hill and counsel be allowed to inspect the grand jury record. The demurrer was based on the ground that the indictment shows vagueness, indefiniteness and lack of materiality.

First to come before the propaganda pursuers when they reassemble next week will be Douglas M. Stewart, publisher, and George T. Eggleston, editor, of Scribner's Commentator, a magazine published in New York.

Their employe and sales promotion manager, Bessie Feagin, tall and attractive brunet, lost her skirmish with the grand jury over evasion of questions fired by Asst. Atty. Gen. William P. Maloney and Edward G. Hickey.
