Indictments Due In Propaganda Grand Jury Hears

Grim-faced grand jurors in their first session since the United States went to war appeared to be clearing their dockets for action late yesterday against the axis propagandists whose activities they have investigated for three months.

Ralph Townsend, author of pro-Japanese articles and pamphlets, who vanished a month ago when the Grand Jury called him and could not be found in a nationwide hunt launched by G-men, spent four hours before the in-

wide hunt launched by G-men, spent four hours before the in-quisitorial body yesterday. It appeared that indictments from the group, which has been listening to enemy propaganda ac tivities for three months, would be handed down before the end ol this week. Townsend was called before the grand jury, it is known, for ques-tioning about his Japanese con nections in the United States Townsend frequently wrote for a publication which has been under surveillance for its pro-Nazi at-titude. The dark, curly-haired writer, who once was a United States Vice Consul in Japan, appeared in Washington last week following the declaration of war and sub-mitted to the Justice Department a long letter in which he declared his loyality to this nation. Later he said the United States would beat Japan.
