## ura Ingalls Posts. \$7,500 Bond; Indicted As Paid Nazi Agent

Star 12/2014 Grand Jury Broadens Accusation Against Noted Aviatrix

Laura Ingalls, record-breaking flyer of the 1930s, surrendered and posted \$7,500 bond today with the clerk of District Criminal Court in response to an indictment returned yesterday charging her with falling to register with the State Depart-ment as a paid Nazi agent.

ment as a pain Nazi agent. The bond was, in effect, renewal of a bond in like amount posted when she was arraigned several days ago before United States Com-missioner Needham C. Turnage. She was released on the transferred bond.

No date for her arraignment on the indictment was set, but officials said, unless an earlier time was set, it would take place January 9.

It would take place January 9. Miss Ingalls faces a greatly broad-ened accusation in the District grand jury indictment which re-placed a previous warrant. Her ar-rest followed an investigation by the F. B. I.

rest followed an investigation by the F. B. I. The grand jury doubled the time during which she is accused of the crime, declaring that from March 1 the woman flyer and anti-interven-tionist leader agreed to act "as a public relations counsel, publicity agent, agent and representative for" the German government. She re ceived "compensation from and was under the direction of the govern-ment of the German Reich," the in-dictment declared. For the first time the name of Baron Ulrich von Gienanth was Second Secretary of the German Embassy he was named as one of those who worked with her. Contact between the flyer and the Embassy was maintained "clandes-tinely, by means of intermediaries and otherwise, and in a manner de-signed to conceal the true nature of her activities," the indictment charged. charged. Just how much money she re-ceived the grand jury said it did not know. When Justice F. Dickinson Letts received the jury report in District Court, Government prosecutors asked for the bench warrant im-mediately.

Neil Andrews, Arthur B. Caldwell, Edward J. Hickey, jr., and James McInerney, all acting under direction of As-sistant Attorney General Wendell Berge. Berge.
