## Green Asks Outlawing of Red & 'Nazi Parties

President William Green of the American Federation of Labor proposed today that Congress outlaw the Communist Party and the Green and the Green and the Green and the Green and national safety and national defense.

He said officers must be backed to the full extent of the law in dealing with "treachery and fifth column" ac-tivities."

Declaring that the A. F. of L. has never been "hoodwinked" by Commu-nist, Nazi of Fascist propaganda, Mr.

"We consider it shameful that a labor group, not affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, bitterly opposed these measures and lent itself to underhanded attacks on the Federal Bureau of Investigation."

Mr. Green called upon the graduates, an empresentatives of police officials

Mr. Green called upon the graduates, as representatives of police officials thruout the nation, to punish criminals and racketeers "who may have crept into the labor movement ... just as fearlessly as you would stamp out racketeering in business or in any other walk of life." The A. F. of L. he said, has neither the authority or facilities for such a function for those who may have infiltrated its organiwho may have infiltrated its organization.

He said attempts have been made by "ignorant, malicious and prejudiced persons to smear the entire labor

flew individuals" much in the same manner as others used "to defame the police forces of our cities and nation."
"Such indiscriminating attacks," he said, "are vicious because they seek to blind the public to the great accomplishments of wholesome oversuitstiened. plishments of wholesome organizations by blowing up tiny molehills of evi-dence into lurid mountains of accusa-tions."
