KLAN PLANS REVIVAL

"At its Atlanta, Ga., convention in June," writes "The Hour," "the Klan decided to raise \$1,000,000,000 for an 'Americanization Campaign.' Michigan, once a center for KKK activity, was selected as the testing ground for the program and Detroit is now witnessing the fruits of this decision."

An intense KKK recruiting drive Peace, which describes its sponsors states, pointing out that numerous workers fresh from the South have been employed in recent months.
