John Doe subpena, is Ray Helgersen, who was press agent here for the Dominican military president, Gen. Rafael Trujillo, from two days after the Haitian massacre in the late fall of 1937 until resigning April 3, 1938.

NO. 1 DICTATOR The massacre set in motion such a revulsion of American opinion that Rep. Ham Fish twice denounced the Duninican government on the House floor, classing Trujillo as the new world's No. 1 dictator and calling for American non-recognition of his tiny Carribean country. Mr. Helgersen, who had been at in-tervals with Mrs. Eleanor Patterson's paper from 1932 until Aug. 8, 1937, thereafter assumed the job of getting Gen. Trujillo a "good press" on a three-year contract specifying \$17,500 a year. One triumph of press agentry which he cites was a 100-plate dinner for Trujillo at the Mayflower. "One of the guests," Mr. Helgersen told The News, "was Gen. Marshall (Army Chief of Staff). Everybody said I wouldn't be able to get anybody to meet Trujillo." SUCCEEDED BY DJAMGAROFF

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Mr. Helgersen stepped down from the job in April of 1938, after drawing less than a third of the annual salary. His place was taken by Mr. George Djam-garoff, the black browed white Russian, who consented to represent Trujillo for \$50,000 per annum.

\$50,000 per annum. It was he who later arranged Mr. Fish's voyage of exploration to Santo Domingo, following which at a decorous interval Trujillo visited this country. At a still more brilliant dinner in New York, the swarthy Dominican was hailed as the inaugurator of his coun-try's "golden age."

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FISH GOT \$25,000 The hailer was Mr. Fish, to whose credit Trujillo one week later had de-posited the sum of \$25,000, half of which was subsequently returned, the rest allegedly distributed between Mr. Fish's private bank account or used in purchases which the New York Rep-resentative now explains were dis-astrous wildcat oil speculations in the role of an agent and thus, he con-tends non-reportable as taxable in-come. come.
