RALLY IGNORES RACE AND CREED TO REBUKE BUND

State and City Officials. Clergy Join in Reply to Nazis

New York gave its answer to the Washington's Birthday rally of the German-American Bund last night at a mass meeting at Carnegie Hall, which drew a capacity crowd of more than 3,500.

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Men and women of varied faiths, races and political beliefs—leaders who often find themselves in sharp disagreement on public issues—united in denouncing the principles of Nazlsm and assuring the audience that America has little to fear from such organizations as the Bund so long as the historic spirit Bund so long as the historic spirit of tolerance exists.

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The meeting was held under the auspices of the Council Against Intolerance in America, with George Gordon Battle as chairman. Speakers included Mayor LaGuardia, Representative Bruce Barton, Lieutenant Governor Charles Poletti and Judge Jeremiah T. Mahoney. Messages were received from Governor Lehman, District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey and other prominent persons who were unable to attend.

Retain Spirit of Freedom

The theme of the meeting was broad tolerance, and most speakers emphasized that the United States has retained its spirit of freedom

has retained its spirit of freedom through other attacks, such as that of the Ku Klux Klan.

Mayor LaGuardia emphasized the American outlook by contrasting the freedom in New York with conditions in some foreign countries—particularly the Germany admired by Bund members.

If Germany could read between the lines of their censored press, he remarked, they must have been surprised that New York allowed the Bund meeting.

As a matter of fact, he said, the city in permitting the Bund to hold its rally put on an "exhibition of international cooties," in accordance with the democratic prin-

He is not concerned about the safety of New York from Nazism, "not as long as I am Mayor," La Guardia declared. He is concerned, however, about the safety of the world, he continued, and especially of the Western Hemisphere.
