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She went to Germany last year, Glass said, and "found out so much that she didn't like that when she returned she gave up her activity in the Bund."

Since then, he said, Vandenberg and other Nazis have threatened the girls and Vandenberg once struck their father i nthe face with a dog whip and was knocked down by him.

Lawyers Desire Case "Right now in this courtroom there is one of the Bund's strong-arm men," Glass declared. "There is a panel of prominent lawyers who are very desirous of appearing in this case.
