

**Bundster Sought  
In Draft Violation** *Post*

San Francisco, Nov. 5 (AP).—Gottfried Karl Hein, described by the Federal Bureau of Investigation as northern California's leading Nazi sympathizer, was indicted by the Federal grand jury late today on charges of violating the Selective Service Act.

An FBI search was started for Hein, who disappeared from his San Francisco home two months ago.

Hein, also known as Carl Hian and George Dreier, was charged with the "wilful and felonious"

failure to report for physical examination and failure to notify his draft board of a change of address. Maximum penalty on each charge is a \$10,000 fine or five years' imprisonment.

Nat J. L. Pieper, special agent in charge of the local FBI office, said Hein had helped organize the German-American Bund in Oakland in 1936 and became its leader.

In 1939, he became head of the San Francisco branch of the bund.

Hein Pieper said, was closely associated with Hermann Schwinn of Los Angeles, West Coast bund leader, and Wilhelm Kunze of New York, national leader of the bund. Both Schwinn and Kunze have been convicted in the East of selective service violation and espionage charges.
