I do not know where Mr. Beecham might be, but it is just possible -- a hunch of mine -- that you might see him when you could talk over things of importance. Take it easy; it will all work out. I'll do all I can that I feel is in best interests of The Chief and the work, and I think the CIO booklet would be an excellent idea. I sent Dr. T. the extra copy of Senate Document No. 14. If he does not need it, will you get it and mail back to me, please, as would like it for the file. Chief may take one any time, and then it might be gone for weeks to months, or get waylaid, you know.

I think if Dr. T. would just tell the people in Montana he is working for best interests of America and therefore themselves, and let them stew -- he isn't any ORDINARY politician who has to cater to whims of those who do not know the score. He'll be proud to stick with us when this flurry is over. There is ONLY ONE road to travel from now on.
