

EXPOSED: Indiana Fascist Industrialist

Seeks Army Revolt Against FDR

Out of the Ku Klux Klan's old stamping ground, Indiana, comes a demand for a revolt in the U. S. Army against its Commander-in-Chief, Franklin D. Roosevelt and his anti-Hitler war program.

The call is contained in a lurid, Nazi-inspired pamphlet written and published by Carl H. Mote, a leading Indiana corporation lawyer and industrialist. It will shock and enrage the patriotic citizens of the Hoosier State as well as the whole nation.

"If and when a Caesar appears," he writes in his pamphlet, **G.O.P. 'Fifth Column' Finds the Electors**, "he is likely to come from the Army and Navy, the Air Force, the Marines, grown weary from the stupidity and interference by revolutionary bureaucrats."

"If and when a Caesar appears," Mote adds, "it is not entirely wishful thinking to believe he will be an American who, even now, has the zeal of a martyr and the courage to defy to the last alien, the conspirators who have planned our country's ruin."

IN SPIRIT OF KLAN

The seditious Ku Klux Klan does not ride openly at night on the banks of the Wabash, but its spirit is not dead. This is proved by Mote's piece of inflammatory pro-Axis propaganda.

Written, presumably, as an at-

tack against the win-the-war policies of Wendell Willkie, the pamphlet is an echo of the discredited "Protocols of Zion," Hitler's "Mein Kampf" in capsule form, and a

suggestion of Lawrence Dennis' fascist blueprint for America.

It is printed on fine paper, with no price on the cover. That Mr. Mote's backers are well-heeled is proved by the fact that he can afford to circulate the pamphlet in a mass edition. He asks readers of the pamphlet to express their opinions—in this way building up a mailing list for his fascist organization.

Mr. Mote's brochure, now being widely circulated, charges Wendell Willkie with having brought about "a fusion of international finance and international Bolshevism."

The democracy slogan, the author says, is mere device invented by the Jews. Moreover, "democracy" is an established feature of Comrade Roosevelt's fireside chats." Just before the Inquisition was about to be launched in Aragon, in the Fifteenth century, the writer of the seditious pamphlet reminds us menacingly, "the Jews launched a great campaign for democracy."

PRAISES FASCISTS

Mr. Mote cites James M. Burnham's fascist-minded "Managerial Revolution" to prove that "America is doomed to suffer something more horrible than Hitlerism." To further his argument he quotes the fascist, Lawrence Dennis, who in turn had quoted the Nazi "ideologist" Arthur Rosenberg!

alleged wave of anti-Semitism in his home state, Indiana, and justifies it in glowing words. Anti-Semitism is "understandable," he declares, in view of the "mismanagement of our domestic affairs for nine long years (since Roosevelt took office—S. G.) by a horde of alien-minded Jews. . . ." This, says Mote, "accounts for the rising tide of so-called (!) anti-Semitism in America."

Mr. Willkie is attacked for denouncing Charles E. Coughlin who is presented by Mote as a martyr in the cause of "true Americanism." Mote's eloquent defense of the fascist priest makes even clearer the organized character of the Indiana industrialist's activities.

IS LEADING FIGURE

Mr. Mote is no penny-a-liner working away at the game of hate for some fascist-inspired publication. He is a highly placed industrialist who in the course of his career has been editor of the Indianapolis Sun (now the Times), secretary of the Public Service Commission of Indiana, attorney and chief counsel for numerous public utility corporations. At present he is:

President and director, the Commonwealth Telephone Corp.,

President and director, Northern Indiana Telephone Co.,

Director, Central Greyhound Lines,

Director, Capital Greyhound Lines, Inc.,

President and director, Anderson-Central Realty Co.,

Mr. Mote clearly fits the definition of Fifth Columnist as described by Earl Browder in his Independence Day Speech at Madison Square Garden.

Warning against the menace of the Fifth Column, Browder declared:

"Uncover the trail of Martin Dies, and it will lead to most of the nests of Hitler's agents in the U.S. whose mission is to break up national unity, throw the public into turmoil, sow suspicion and fear of our allies, and block the way to an all-out effort to win the war. It will lead to a number of politicians, publicists, newspapers, radio commentators, political groupings—and behind them Tory industrialists and financiers, our American counterparts of the German Krupps and Thyssens."

Is there any question but that Mr. Carl H. Mote is one of these Tory industrialists—doing the dirty work of Hitler in this country?

Is his pamphlet "fair comment" under the law—or is it treason? It is treason, and the authors and promoters of this seditious undertaking know it!

It is treason. The U. S. government has the means for putting a stop to treason. This pamphlet, one of Hitler's secret weapons, should be suppressed at once and its authors and promoters prosecuted as enemies of our country.

Trans-Pacific V-Mail System For Army Ready

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 4 (UP).

—Trans-Pacific air service by V-Mail of U. S. servicemen is scheduled to commence late next week coincidental with the completion of sending and receiving equipment installations at Honolulu and San Francisco, the Eastman Kodak Company revealed today.
