

Mahoney Menaces N.Y. With Police-Cl

Mahoney's Claim of Labor Backing Hit By AFL Committee

Switch of Building Trade Council to Tammany Candidate Denied by Non-Partisan Committee for LaGuardia

Jeremiah T. Mahoney, Tammany candidate for mayor, as advised Sunday in a sharply-worded statement issued by the American Federation of Labor Non-Partisan Committee for the re-election of Mayor LaGuardia that he is making a ridiculous spectacle of himself by continuing to claim labor's support.

"It is high time that Jerry Mahoney learned to face reality," the A. F. of L. committee said. "The simple facts are that labor is virtually 100 per cent behind Mayor LaGuardia on his splendid record as a sincere friend of the working men and women of this city."

"Of course, it is easy to see why Mahoney is loath to accept this situation gracefully. Nevertheless, the facts are facts, and if the Mayor's argument doesn't want to forfeit completely what small shreds of belief still attach to statements coming from his headquarters, he will conciliate himself without delay to the fact that 750,000 members of more than 150 A. F. of L. unions in five boroughs are supporting Mayor LaGuardia for re-election."

SWITCH DENIED

The statement was occasioned by renewed claims from the Mahoney "labor" committee that the Building Trades Council, covering more than 325,000 workers, in more than 30 different construction trades unions, had switched its support to Mahoney.

The A. F. of L. group declared flat, even in the face of emphatic denials by Joseph McInerney, newly-elected president of the Building Trades Department of A. F. of L., and by Thomas A. Murray, head of the local Building Trades Council, "one Peter Cassidy, described as the chairman of Mahoney's so-called labor committee, today had the temerity to insist that the Building Trades Council is supporting Mahoney."

N.M.U. TO ASK C.I.O. MARITIME FEDERATION

The National Conference of the Committee for Industrial Organization will be asked to take steps to form a National Industrial Maritime Federation, Joseph Curran, general organizer for the National Maritime Union, announced yesterday.

Already, Curran said, steps were being taken by various marine unions to cooperate with one another in the formation of such a federation.

The hope is, he continued, to secure the eventual affiliation in such a body of all the 750,000 persons engaged, directly or indirectly, in marine transportation.

The rank and file leader explained that marine and harbor unions both on the East and West Coast were looking forward to the formation of such a Federation under the leadership of the C.I.O.

"The National Maritime Union, which has enrolled more than 50,000 unlicensed seamen on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts since its formation last Spring," Curran said, "is in the process of voting now on the question of C.I.O. affiliation."

"Indications are that the vote will be around 97 per cent for the C.I.O. Other marine unions have either voted already or are taking referendums at the present time.

Mosley Stoned In Liverpool

Blackshirt Leader Gets Concussion at Meeting

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 10 (UP).—Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of England's black-shirted fascists, was knocked unconscious and sent to a hospital today during an open air mass meeting of his followers.

A hospital bulletin said Mosley suffered a concussion and a punctured skull, necessitating a minor operation.

Mosley, who figured in serious clashes in London a week ago today when anti-fascists broke up a parade of 9,000 of his cohorts, arrived at the Liverpool meeting in a van equipped with loud-speaker apparatus.

The van was driven into the center of a crowd of 8,000 persons, most of whom were anti-fascists.

Mosley clambered atop the van but before he was able to utter a word he was pelted with stones and fell unconscious to the ground.

Rioting broke out and 20 persons were injured before mounted police drove into the crowd and formed a cordon about the van. Many demonstrators were arrested.

Allu, who led an uprising of thousands of warriors and occupied the important center of Socota, were captured by natives belonging to the Azebo Galla tribe and were beheaded, the officials asserted.

The uprising occurred during the latter part of September.

The Ethiopians swept as far north as Malceu, killing mostly Italian officers and soldiers. According to the officials, the Italian Viceroy, Field Marshal Rodolfo Graziani, ordered the Italian soldiers and native troops to "show no mercy" in putting down the revolt.
