## Author Tells of Hitler Boast He Could Cause United States Revolt

a threat to the power of the Reich At the time, the witness explained. he was president of the Old Free City of Danzig, and the conversation took place at the chancellory in Berlin, occurring immediately after Dr. Rauschning had returned from a meeting of the League of Nations in Geneva.

Dr. Rauschning said he warned Hitler that the situation at Geneva was very tense, following the with-drawal of Germany from the League of Nations and that there was a possibility that Great Britain and, in the final analysis, the United States might wage war on the Reich. "Adolf Hitler said," the witness added, "he had no fear that the United States would again join a coalition of western democracies against Germany. He said he would be able to make this latent revolution come to pass. He ex-plained the methods by which he would be able to paralyze the na-tional unity of the United States and the power of resistance in this country." country

The witness said Hitler then spoke

of the racial minorities in this coun-try, saying that such cleavages could be widened to disunite the unity of the country. The Fuehrer indi-cated, Dr. Rauschning said, that the United States "must become a Ger-man nation," but he would not de-pend on the German minority in pend on the German minority in this country, using instead all mi-nority groups to bring about his

nority groups to bring about all mi-purpose. The witness said Hitler went on to explain why America was "such a weak state," comparing democ-racies with the disease syphillis. Dr. Rauschning said Hitler dis-cussed plans to assure the "neu-trality" of the armed forces in all countries which might possibly be-come enemies of Germany. Rulings Delayed. Chief Prosecutor O. John Rogge brought in this evidence as the first direct attempt to prove the charge in the indictment that Hitler him-self was the arch conspirator in

in the indictment that Hitler nim-self was the arch conspirator in this case. The 26 defendants on trial are charged with allowing themselves to be used as tools in a Nazi conspiracy to undermine the morale and loyalty of the American ermed formes
