Bullitt Named To General Aniline Board

Bullitt, president Roosevelt's spe-cial Ambassador to the Near East-ern battle area, was elected a direc-tor of the General Aniline & Film Corporation today in the latest move in the process of Americanizing the formerly German-controlled corpor-ation.

Bullitt succeeds William vom Rath, son of Walther vom Rath, of I. G. Farbenindustrie, the German Dye Trust, whose resignation was disclosed last Sunday.
Bullitt's election, reflecting the personal interest of President Roose-velt in the corporation's future, was announced today before it actually took place. John E. Mack, who was elected president of General Ani-line last October 31, among other reasons because of his close personal friendship with the President, made the announcement at 10:30 a. m. in the company's offices. The directors 'met at 4 p. m. and elected Bullitt.
Asked whether the United States Government had taken a hand in the selection of Bullitt for the va-cancy, Mack said: "Inasmuch as Bullitt is the personal representa-tive of the President, flying with ambassadorial status, you can draw your own inferences." Both Bullitt and Mack are known to have con-ferred with the President recently.
Mack said "a whole lot of things" entered into the selection of Bullitt, including his dynamic personality, his wide business experience, and the fact that he had "no connection with the German interest." He add-ed that Bullitt would return from the Near East in 30 days to take an active part in the management of General Aniline.
With the addition of Bullitt, the board of directors of General Ani-line is now composed of seven na-tive Americans, four naturalized eitizens who were born in Germany and one Swiss citizen, Dr. Felix Iselin.

Iselin. Dr. Iselin, who is also the legal representative of the German Dye Trust in Switzerland and president of I. G. Chemie, a Swiss holding company which claims 91 per cent ownership of General Aniline, has been at Lisbon for more than a month trying to get passage on the Pan-American clipper to come to the United States.

Mack said the company, which is nominally capitalized, at 60 million dollars but is believed to be worth far more than that, is now doing more than half its business with the United States Government, sup-plying khaki dyes for military uni-forms and photographic supplies and apparatus for the Army and Navy.
