

# New Deal Probes Anti-Semitic Drive On New Congress

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—New Deal circles in the capital are investigating a bold attempt to create anti-Semitic feeling in the next Congress.

A yellow-covered pamphlet entitled "What Every Congressman Should Know!" has been widely distributed through the capital. It purports to list the "Jews in our Government" and charges that the New Deal is giving undue representation to the members of the Jewish race.

Upward of 275 Jews are named, including officials of New York State and City Governments and of the CIO.

The Pelley Publishers, Box 1776, Asheville, N. C., are listed as publishers

and distributors of the pamphlet. The preface declares that the growing number of Jews in the Government is "a mischievous thing that Pelley of the Silver Legion is contesting."

The reference apparently is to William Dudley Pelley, whose Silver Shirts figured in a 1934 probe by Congress.

The pamphlet describes the contents as "a plain, unbiased, simple roster of political appointees or fed-

eral jobholders of this one race under Mr. Roosevelt."

The pamphlet lists Secretary of State Cordell Hull with the notation, "married Frances, daughter of Isaac Witz of Staunton, Va." It declares that the mother of President Roosevelt's trusted European adviser, Ambassador to France William Bullitt, was Louisa Gross (Horowitz).

Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, who has issued a formal denial of Jewish descent, also appears on the Pelley list of Jews in the New Deal.

### Pelley Convicted in 1935.

William Dudley Pelley was tried and convicted in Asheville in January, 1935, for violating the blue sky laws of North Carolina. The charge was that he sold worthless stock of the Galahad Press, publishers of Liberation, official journal of his Silver Shirt Legion.

Pelley was sentenced to one to two years in the state prison, but on payment of an alternative

# Hitler Double X of Duce Heartens London, Paris

Adolf Hitler's double-cross of his friend and ally, Benito Mussolini, appeared to be "in" last night, resulting in an immediate stiffening of the attitude of Great Britain and France to Germany and Italy.

On the heels of diplomatic reports that Hitler's personal adjutant had arrived secretly in Paris with the Fuehrer's reply to the French question, "What will you do in event of a Franco-Italian war?" these developments took place:

Prime Minister Chamberlain announced Britain would support France against Italy's claim to Tunisia.

French Foreign Minister Bonnet announced France would never surrender an inch of her colonial empire to Italy.

Mussolini, "in view of the general situation," had his Cabinet announce new record appropriations for armaments.

## Great Britain Says She Will Aid France

(By United Press)

London, Dec. 14.—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain today shelved at least temporarily his hope of friendship with Germany and threw Britain's strength behind France in a united front against the menacing demands of Europe's dictators.

The Prime Minister, openly rebuffed when Nazi diplomats boycotted a dinner Tuesday night at which he assailed anti-British "vituperations" in the German press, warned of Britain's "grave concern" over any Italian action against French Tunisia.

### Embassy Under Guard.

The German Embassy was under a strong police guard to prevent hostile demonstrations by Britons as newspapers screamed headlines of an "affront" to the head of the British Government at the jubilee banquet of the Foreign Press Association.

The boycott of the banquet by

German Ambassador Herbert von Dirksen, German newspaper correspondents and even Hitler's personal envoy was understood to have been at Hitler's express instructions.

Possible recall of the German Ambassador, an item of particular speculation in the British press, was believed to hinge upon a short-hand report of Chamberlain's speech rushed to Hitler during the day.

Developments in the situation, which held the prospect that Britain and France again might find themselves aligned against the totalitar-

# FRANCE WON'T YIELD, EVEN IF IT MEANS WAR

Paris, Dec. 14 (U.P.).—Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet announced today that Italy must realize that "even if it means war" France never will surrender a single inch of Tunisia, Djibouti, Corsica or any other part of the French Colonial Empire.

Simultaneously, it was rumored that Chancellor Hitler's personal adjutant, Capt. Fritz Weidemann, had arrived secretly in Paris with Der Fuehrer's answer whether Germany would go to Italy's aid in event of war between Italy and France.

Diplomats heard that Weidemann had arrived and the German Embassy neither denied nor confirmed the report.

Before German Foreign Minister

Joachim von Ribbentrop left Paris after signing the new Franco-German anti-war pact, Bonnet asked him what Hitler would do in case Italo-French tension led to war.

Answering questioners in the Chamber's Foreign Affairs Committee today, Bonnet said that Ribbentrop had told him that Germany would remain faithful to her obligations under the Rome-Berlin axis but has "no direct interests in the Mediterranean."

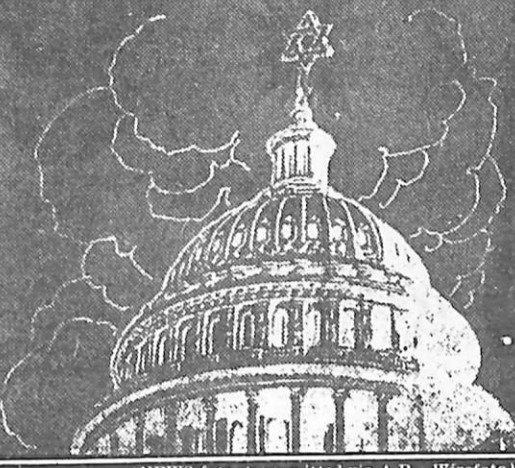

### THE NRA

The National Industrial Recovery Act (NRA) is said to have been conceived by and, in substance written by Felix Frankfurter, and financed by Edward A. Filene's Twentieth Century Fund. Section 3, title I, was declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court on May 27, 1935. On June 14, 1935, Congress passed a resolution extending a "skeleton" NRA to April 1, 1936, when its activities and personnel were transferred to the Department of Commerce.
