

Silver Shirt Trial Slated For Tuesday

Fascist Jailed for Disorderly Conduct at Beer Tavern Tilt; 4 Anti-Nazis Also Held Over

Four anti-Nazis and a member of fascist Silver Shirts will go to trial next Tuesday, Nov. 29, charged with disorderly conduct following fascist violence outside of a beer tavern at 876 N. Wells St., last Wednesday night.

The case was continued yesterday in the Judge Eugene L. McGarry's Chicago Ave. Police Court at the request of the fascist, Charles A. Ariet, who declared he was without counsel.

The clash came as sentiment against Nazi outrages mounted throughout the city and the local Silver Shirt organization announced they would hold an anti-Semitic orgy, headed by Roy Zachary, "Field Marshal" of the fascist group.

The meeting was scheduled for the Engineering Bldg., 205 W. Wacker Dr. Mass protests, however, forced the building management to cancel the contract for the Auditorium of the building. The fascist group then moved its members to the North Wells St. saloon.

CANCEL CONTRACT

Mr. E. J. Rudel, in charge of renting in the Engineering Bldg., declared that when the real nature of the organization was learned, the contract was cancelled.

When informed that a similar organization, headed by the notorious Chicago fascist, Newton Jenkins, had a meeting scheduled for December 6 in the same auditorium, Mr. Rudel told the Daily Record that the meeting would not be held there.

"When we learned what kind of organization they were," he said, "we turned down their applications to use our hall."

The Silver Shirt organization, dressed in full regalia resembling Nazi uniforms, met in a tavern owned by Daniel Mentoni, after they were ousted from the downtown auditorium.

TELLS GROUP TO LEARN

The leader of the group, Roy Zachary, ~~sounded the call for~~ the members to arm themselves with guns and ammunition. Zachary, at a previous meeting, declared he would assassinate President Roosevelt if no one else dared to.

The fascists, aroused to a fever pitch by the incitement of Zachary, then attacked a group of people who had assembled outside the tavern spontaneously, in a demonstration against the meeting.

In the clash, police seized Mike Sanders, 1010 Lawrence Ave., Edward Lytton, 1326 N. Clark St., Jack Shiffo, 2003 W. Division St., and Hyman Giskin, 1912 Crystal St., as well as the Silver Shirt, Ariet.

Sanders was so severely beaten by the fascists assault that he had to be taken to the hospital for treatment.
