Westrick Gets Ready To Leave Scarsdale

Dr. Gerhard Alois Westrick, Germany's envoy to American business, today prepared to move from his comfortable Scarsdale home to please a landlord who was not amused by "spy stuff in the papers."

"My sole duty in this country is to prepare the way for trade between Germany and the United States after the European war," Dr. Westrick declared as Harold A. Callan, back from his upstate summer home, asked cancellation of the three-month lease on his Westchester residence.

"Their being in my house doesn't do the house any good," Mr. Callan explained. "If I had known who he was I would not have closed the deal. He told me he represented a large American interest."

Dr. Westrick agreed to get out by the end of this week. There were reports that he planned to take his wife and two sons back to Germany. This report, however, appeared to be contradicted by his determination to re-instate his driver's license and diplomatic license plates, suspended by Carroll Mealey, State Commissioner of Licenses.

In a conference with Mr. Mealey, Dr. Westrick denied he had made false statements in his application. He drove for an hour with an inspector to prove that he was "a satisfactory driver," denied that he had an artificial limb although he had previously described himself as "an old soldier with a wooden leg."—J.
