
Dear Bud:

On June 7, 1971, the federal judge hearing our case through it out of court. I was unable to be present in court but my attorneys told me that the Government, which argued first, presented no new material other than what was contained in their original brief. It would therefore seem that the matter had been decided before it went to court. In reviewing our briefs and that of the Government, I fail to see how an unbiased mind could support the Government's position, if indeed it was unbiased.

The question now, is whether or not the case can be appealed. My lawyers feel it is a worth while case and would like to pursue it but the lowest price that could be reached was \$750.00 which is less than half of what they would normally charge. My problem is that I simply do not have that money on hand at this time and the notice of appeal must be filed within thirty days of the judgement. I would ask you to study the enclosed material along with that which I have already sent you and to decide whether or not you agree with them, contact them if you wish. If you feel it has merit, can you handle the appeal or, can the Committee finance it or do you have any fast money making schemes in mind?

Your earliest possible reply is needed.
