I'm sending Jim the copy you enclosed with your 6/14, which did not come until today. And then the mail was two hours late so I could not send it today, as I would have when I had to go into town at noon. It is that significant.

It is not only "interesting," as you say, but the most probable explanation for what I am certain is a dangerous deception of judge who appears to be a no-~~long~~ crap judge.

I'll be asking Jim to send the judge and the AUSA copies as soon as he gets this one and can make better ones than I can.

Please, posthaste, send Jim, not me, anything else you have than can have any other relevance. You refer to having "a few internal Commission documents" relating to this #flap." They have not indicated the second one. Have you any notion ^{who} ~~what~~ it may be?

I'm also sending Jim your letter so he can ask for the rest by phone and ~~say~~ say he needs it in a hurry to present to a court. They have already given the judge the transcripts.

Let me add to this and let us know the cost.

Send Jim four copies of each things, one for him, one for the judge, one for the AUSA and one for me. To be within the norms he has to send maybe two copies to the court, so please add another. This will not only make for better copies but will save him an extra trip to get copies made. It can save us several days and by now the time is an important factor. The judge may rule first if we are not fast.

This can be exceedingly important, so please do it as fast as possible.

Probably if you can find a willing student writing the entries on cards would take no more time and would be more permanent. I think you realize this means nothing to me personally. I do not use the indexes very much and when I do I recall the book and grabbing it is faster for me. However, in the future it can become a valuable research tool for others.

It is more than 100 miles round trip for students who come here. I can't ask them to do what is not essential. One was due here today to be paid for painting the cabinet I've obtained to keep them in but he neither came nor phoned.
