Dear Mr. Bellamy,

In accordance with your letter of 9/22, I enclose herewith the completed SF-115 for my Uncle Cohen and my death.

Your letter says "It is necessary for you to submit the SF-115 form. Is this really the case? Or is it that you can register it and so close? I do not see a number doubt you can do this. What I am asking is merely does the Department make this requirement universal? As with each writing on the current National form, with the Government and with others who write what is pleasing to officials?

Using this form makes me feel it will be necessary to go to court. That, I assure you, I would like to avoid. Hence my initial suggestion that we dispose with unnecessary formalities.

May I use this occasion to remind you of a number of unanswered letters, not included in what are so briefly described as responses by Mr. Eli M. Shost and Mr. Nathanson in their letters to Mr. Rumborick? I would appreciate getting responsive answers.

For your information, I have accepted Mr. Nathanson's suggestion and written Judge Surran stating that I believe to be passing by your Mr. Anderson. I did not tell him the Department's official statement described his order as "voluntary", although, if I had, I would have been doing no more than recommending Mr. Nathanson.

I do thank you for the promptness of your reply and for your thoughtfulness in enclosing the form.
