AFFIDAVIT OF SALLIANN M. DOUGHERTY

- I, Salliann M. Dougherty, being duly sworn, depose and say as follows:
- 1) I am an attorney employed by the Civil Rights
 Division of the United States Department of Justice in
 Washington, D.C. From October 1976 through September 1979,
 I was the Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts Officer for
 the Civil Rights Division. In this assignment, my duties
 the Civil Rights Division of the processing of all Freedom
 included the coordination of the processing of all Freedom
 of Information and Privacy Act requests to the Civil Rights
 Division.

The facts stated in this affidavit are based upon my personal knowledge of the processing of plaintiff's Freedom of Information Act request and upon information obtained by me in my official capacity.

- 2) In the course of my official duties I participated in the processing of the Freedom of Information Act request of James H. Lesar, on behalf of Harold Weisberg, for twenty-eight specific categories of records pertaining to the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
 - 3) In December 1977, in an effort to ensure that the Civil Rights Division had fully complied with Mr. Lesar's Freedom of Information Act request, the staff of the Division's Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts Branch,

under my supervision, began an extensive search to locate and index all records pertaining to the assassination of Dr. King which were in the custody of the Civil Rights Division.

This project, involving review of over 100 separate file sections, initially occupied three staff members and myself, full-time, for nearly a month. Final work on the project was completed in May 1978.

- 4) It was determined that all Civil Rights Division records pertaining to the assassination of Dr. King are contained in a multi-section file indexed as DJ 144-72-662, including the eight DJ 144-72-662 file sections referred to in paragraph 3 of Quinlan J. Shea, Jr.'s April 17, 1980 letter to Harold Weisberg. Records pertaining to the extradition of James Earl Ray are contained in a multi-section file indexed as DJ 95-100-473. These files include FBI-derivitive classified documents.
- 5) To ensure that no responsive document was overlooked, the staff of the Division's Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts Branch also searched seven other DJ files and concluded that these did not contain records responsive to Mr. Lesar's request.
- above, I was able to determine that all Civil Rights
 Division documents which fall within the 28 specific
 categories of information requested by Mr. Lesar have been
 released to him. In addition, all records responsive to
 his request which originated within the Criminal Division
 were referred to that Division, pursuant to 28 C.F.R.
 §16.4(a), for final release determination and response to
 the requester.

- 7) Many of the records within the Civil Rights
 Division's file pertaining to the assassination of Dr.
 King, which are responsive to the plaintiff's request, are
 copies of reports which originated in the Federal Bureau
 of Investigation (FBI). Although the Civil Rights Division
 could have referred these records to the FBI for release,
 pursuant to 28 C.F.R. §16.4(a), in this instance no
 referral was made because the FBI was simultaneously
 processing the same request and was already searching its
 files for records responsive to Mr. Lesar's request.
 However, to ensure that all responsive FBI documents
 located within the Civil Rights Division file had, in fact,
 also been located and processed by the FBI, I handdelivered a copy of the Civil Rights Divison's index
 (referred to in Item 3 above) to the FBI.
- 8) To the best of my knowledge, there are no Civil Rights Divison records responsive to Mr. Lesar's request which have not been disclosed to him.
